Find Out How Our Streams Connect and Sustain Us at the 12th Annual Family Stream Day

Join us for the 12th annual Family Stream Day event on Saturday, October 19th, from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Loudoun Water's Administration Building in Ashburn (44865 Loudoun Water Way, Ashburn, VA 20147). Family Stream Day's fun and interactive outdoor environmental education activities teach students and their parents about our Loudoun County streams and the plants and animals that these streams and streamside habitats support. Co-sponsored by the Loudoun Watershed Watch (LWW) and the Loudoun Environmental Stewardship Alliance (LESA), Family Stream Day is held in October to pay local tribute to World Water Monitoring Day and the Anniversary of the Clean Water Act. It is the only event of its kind in Loudoun.

During this free event, students and families will enjoy interactive, hands-on activities that teach about our local watersheds, the plants and animals that live in these rich habitats, ways to test stream water quality, how we benefit from and impact our streams, and more. Kids will receive a reusable tote bag and a Family Stream Day "Passport" to have stamped at each station as they participate in the activities. The stations, led by several local organizations, will be located outside the rear of the Aquiary Building weather permitting or inside in the lobby area in the event of inclement weather. In addition to the outside exhibits and activities, the Aquiary offers informative indoor exhibits that explain the fascinating facts behind drinking water and water reclamation, water conservation, watersheds and more. Both the Aquiary's indoor education exhibits and outdoor interpretive trails will be open to visit throughout the Stream Day event. Participants are encouraged to wear comfortable walking shoes and bring water.

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At 1:00 p.m. on the day of the event, winners of the annual Family Stream Day Poster, Poem, and Photography Contest will be announced and awarded prizes generously donated by the Loudoun Wildlife Conservancy (www.loudounwildlife.org). The theme of this year's contest, which is open to all students in Loudoun County, is '*Stream Dreams and Aquatic Adventures*'. <u>Contest rules</u> may be downloaded from the Loudoun Watershed Watch website.

This annual event tips our local hat to World Water Monitoring Day (September 18) and commemorates 38 years of the Clean Water Act and watershed awareness. About Loudoun Watershed Watch

Formed in 2000, Loudoun Watershed Watch's (LWW) primary goal is to monitor and protect water resources in Loudoun County by raising local students' and others' awareness of Loudoun's water resources and engage them in meaningful, hands-on water science activities. LWW has been working in three areas: compiling and examining existing water quality data; designing a comprehensive surface water monitoring program covering all significant streams in the county; and implementing a public outreach program to raise citizen awareness and involvement in local water quality. LWW hopes its reports and initiatives will encourage citizens and elected officials to take actions that support environmental stewardship that benefits our local waters.
